

"Let's Talk Shoulders"

Every dog regardless of breed or mixed breed has two bones in the front assembly. The two bones of the fore–assembly are the "shoulder blade (scapula) and the upper arm (humerus). The "front assembly" is also known as "the fore assembly". The size, shape, and angle of the fore assembly will determine how the dog looks in profile as well as how the dog moves. For the most part, the angle of the shoulder of working, herding and sporting breeds call for a well laid back or "well angulated shoulder" depending on the original purpose of the breed and its function.



How do we examine the fore-assembly on our German Shepherd Dog? Place your thumb and index finger of your right hand at the point of the shoulder blades (at the top of the point of the shoulder) place the same fingers of the left hand at the end of the shoulder (where the shoulder blade joins the upper arm). Try this on different dogs to see if you can detect a difference in the length and angle of the shoulder blade. Place your index finger on the upper arm where it attaches to the shoulder blade, follow the blade to where it is attached to the fore-leg. Can you determine the length and angle of the upper arm?

The fore-assemble affects other parts of the dog. For example; a short, upright shoulder blade makes for a shorter neck AND A LONGER BACK which affects the dog's balance. It is common to see a short upper arm (humerus) associated with a short upright shoulder blade. This incorrect fore-assembly pushes the entire "fore-assembly" forward resulting in lack of fore-chest and now you have limited lung and heart space in the fore-chest which inhibits a working/herding breed.

In conclusion, for a dog to exhibit a fluid, ground covering gait the dog must be blessed with a foreassembly consisting of a well-laid back shoulder blade (NOT UPRIGHT) of good length, which is attached to an upper arm which is also of good length AND attached at an angle. A shoulder which is well laid back, of correct length and attached to short upper arm will result in an up and down motion of the foreleg or a very short step in front. Throughout the history of our breed, wise and successful breeders have recognized how difficult it is to recover those rare and extraordinary front assembles once they are lost. Certain pre-potent stud dogs and brood bitches have been known for producing correct front assemblies - do you know who they were/are? Next month's feature article:

Mix together and form small balls about the size of a marble. Bake in 350 degree oven for approximately 20 minutes.


AKC Grand Championship levels become Titles

Effective April 1, 2016, the AKC Grand Championship levels will become titles. The change will be retroactive to the beginning of the program. Dogs that earned an achievement level (Bronze, Silver, Gold, or Platinum) in the past will have it officially added on their record. Going forward, title certificates will be issued when a dog achieves the required points needed. Additionally, dogs can earn multiple levels of the Grand Champion Platinum title for every 800 GCH points earned. This will be displayed by a multiplier such as GCHP2. Below is a simple table of the new title abbreviations and the number of points needed for the title.

Title	Abbreviation	GCH Points Needed
Grand Champion Bronze	GCHB	100
Grand Champion Silver	GCHS	200
Grand Champion Gold	GCHG	400
Grand Champion Platinum	GCHP	800

Training Collars 101


Did you know that a dog's neck is totally different than a human's neck. A dog's neck is layered with thick muscle and fur, and the esophagus and the trachea are located beneath the neck muscle. It is very similar to your thigh or a strong man's bicep! This is why a dog can drag you down the block and not be too affected. We train using neck pressure and the "zipping" sound of the collar. When a mother dog trains her puppy she uses neck pressure to communicate. For example, when a puppy strays from the birthing box, the mother will grab the puppy by the neck and use neck pressure to bring it back. By using training collars we are following the mother's way of discipline and communication.



Chain Collars

The universal training collar is the chain "choke" collar or otherwise known as the chain slip collar. We use metal slip collars because the SOUND of the metal can be very effective in training. A chain color used properly should never "choke" your dog.

For a proper fit the choke collar should only have two to three inches of running chain. For fast growing puppies, allow four inches. In order to work properly, this collar has to slip easily. One way to fit the slip collar correctly on your dog is to hold the collar in front of you and make the letter "P" with the chain. Stand in front of your dog's nose and slip the "P" over the dog's head.



Try placing the chain collar on your arm and snapping the chain. You'll see that the chain releases easily if you have it on the right way. If it's on backwards, you'll see it doesn't release easily, it will only tighten on your arm. Always make sure you have the collar on correctly when training your dog and never leave a training collar on your dog when she is not being trained.

New Agility Program - ACT

The AKC Agility Department announced the launch of a new, beginning level, agility program called ACT (Agility Course Test). The ACT program officially launches on March 1, 2016. Breeders of Merit are listed on the websites of the American Kennel Club, The German Shepherd Dog Club of America, and the German Shepherd Dog Club of Atlanta. The requirements to be an AKC (American Kennel Club) Breeder of Merit are as follows:

- 1. Must have a history of at least five years involvement with AKC events.
- 2. Must have earned AKC Conformation, Performance or Companion* event titles on a minimum of four dogs from AKC litters they bred/co-bred..
- 3. Must be a member of an AKC club.
- 4. Must certify that applicable health screens are performed on breeding stock as recommended by the Parent Club (OFA Hips/Elbows, GSDCA Temperament Test).
- 5. Must demonstrate a commitment to ensure 100% of puppies produced are AKC registered.

Through programs and activities, members learn about all aspects of the German Shepherd Dog, including mental and physical development; the breed standard; working ability; breeding; care and rearing of puppies; etc...
