





HOW FORM/FUNCTION CONNECT CROP/DOCK VIA CITIZEN SCIENCE

and vision to hunt and detect. This has led to the argument that ear cropping is not a fashion and is linked to a breed's form and/or function. The problem for these breeders is that surgery involves anesthesia, which also has been connected to the concern that it could produce pain and suffering if not enough anesthesia is given during surgery.

In order to better understand the uses for docking and cropping, there needs to be a review and a study that examines the issues and how they are linked to important breed functions. For exam-

ple, one could argue that standing ears are needed so the dog can rely on their ability to better hear and respond to things in their environment. This would explain why many breeds

ds

with naturally hanging ears often dock them. Regardless of which argument is used, the controversy continues and begs for a small study that looks at a breed's form and function. A Citizen Science study could shed light on both of these issues. Ear cropping has generally been associated with certain breeds, particularly those used for guarding, hunting, and fighting. The popularity of ear cropping occurs in many breeds such as Doberman Pinschers, Great Danes, and Boxers, and the practice began in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Much of the controversy focuses on questions that involve fashion versus function, surgery, pain and suffering. This all leads to the argument that the procedure is used for aesthetic and cosmetic purposes in order to give a dog a particular 'look'. Others argue that cropped ears make the dog look tougher and more intimidating. Most of these arguments fail to back up their claims, and there is little support to address the surgical procedure that is said

- · Pain, especially if performed without anesthesia.
- · Infection: Cropped ears can become infected.
- · Scarring: Can lead to further pain.
- Distorted ears: May not stand up or may have a distorted shape or position.
- Behavioral issues: Can make dogs more likely to be misinterpreted as aggressive.
- Communication difficulties: Dogs use their ears to communicate, and without their natural ears, they may struggle to communicate, which can lead to aggression.
- Hearing: May affect a dog's awareness. Dogs move their ears to help them interpret sounds.
- Emotional trauma: Cropping is usually performed on young puppies between 6-12 weeks of age. The surgical procedure is said to cause pain and suffering,

A Citizen Science study using the Acorn Grant approach would allow breeders, breed clubs and researchers the opportunity to study and evaluate the results of both issues. It would be an effort to see if they are connected to the form and function of these breeds.

WHY THE CONCERN?

For more than a generation, the Animal Rights groups (AR) have successfully carried out a systematic campaign against purebred dog owners. Today, there are laws in cities and states that affect the future for many breeds. The AR has successfully used a wide range of strategies and approaches aimed at breeds they believe have traits that are extreme or unnatural, such as those with extreme angulation along with the chondrodysplasia, hairless and

brachycephalic breeds. All are associated with AKC purebred dog breeders.

History shows that undefined labels are one of the best ways to drive the winds that have already al-

tered and brought about changes in the dog world. The growing interest in animal welfare has been used to craft labels which can be applied to certain AKC breeds and events where breeds and breeders can become the candidates for anti-dog legislation. Over the years the AR has used the power of undefined labels to capture the public's interest and attention with great success.

History has demonstrated that labels are an effective way to drive ideas. They are not new in the industrialized world. Advertising agencies and political campaigns use them to influence policy, regulations and elections. The hotter the issue, the more dramatic the pitch and the more clever the strategy. When the issue is ideological, labels are used to energize supporters. Labels are also used on websites to announce issues and promote ways to address problems. Combined with slogans, they become even more important as the vehicles for influencing opinions and changing perceptions. Sociologists call this the "labeling process". Many studies have reported how groups and organizations have been targeted. They all confirm that the "labeling process" is effective when applied to specific goals and objectives.


Understanding how the "labeling process" is used to drive more anti-dog legislation is central to the need for a Citizen Science study. For example, we should not overlook why breeders are willing to use undefined labels without ever understanding their meaning or purpose, and more importantly, how they will be used to make them the next victim.

In the dog world, some of the first uses of labels focused on certain breeds and their breeders which influenced changes to policies, zoning regulations and animal legislation. The strategy was to get the breeders and writers to accept their use in conversation, at meetings and on websites. This step also involved critic groups whose job was to develop the arguments needed for court cases and to find the methods that the public and a jury would accept.

In the past, the most popular use of an undefined label was to aim it at the commercial, or high-volume breeders, calling them "puppy mills". Other labels were added which included "overpopulation", "vicious dogs" and "dangerous dogs". While

each enjoyed widespread acceptance, none were ever defined, and in each case, the fancy and the public accepted them without any understanding of what they meant or how they would be used. After more than three decades, the use of undefined labels continues to expand. For these reasons, it is important to appreciate who creates them (change agents), why and how they are used, and what effect they will have on the AKC, veterinary schools, dog clubs, registrations, and ultimately the breeds and their breeders.

A few years ago, a new label was introduced which was designed to make breeders the victim and their pups the target. It was called the "responsible breeder". It focused on the quality of the pups being produced. What made it politically correct was the fact that it had many meanings and interpretations. Most importantly, it offered everyone who "does the right thing" the opportunity to label themselves a "responsible breeder". Underneath its exterior was the special emphasis that focused on the quality of the pups being produced. The label assumed that if a pup was of poor quality, unhealthy or had something wrong, it should not be bred and its parents should be removed from the breeding pool. Most breeders agreed with this notion and responded by selling pups without AKC registration papers or on a limited registration or a spay/neuter contract. The underlying assumption was that they were being "responsible breeders". The notion that the unsound and unhealthy should not be bred was fundamental to the label and it served as the best indicator of whether a breeder was being responsible or not. This strategy also identified some that were better than others. It saluted those who bred to produce quality. Their success proved they could influence important and fundamental issues that breeders would be quick to endorse without ever understanding their impact if they could label themselves a "responsible breeder". This led to a scramble for the use of new and better technologies like DNA. All of this was tied to the "responsible breeder" label and the goal for quality pups. Thus, a responsible breeder could be measured by the number of quality pups they registered and produced. One measure would count the number of pups being sold on a limited registrations or without papers.

The advantage they gained using labels is that they could continue to keep them vague and undefined, which also reduced the chances for resistance. When catchy words and phrases were linked to them, they became more effective. The better labels painted only a general description and thus were able to gather attention and the willingness of breeders and their clubs to use them.

The newest label is aimed at the crop and dock breeds. It is called "qualzucht". Its history is much like that used for the "puppy mill" which was introduced about 30 years ago. This new label called "ra-

dial qualzucht "which translated from German literally means "torture breeding". It refers to pain, suffering, damage and behavioral disorders. It leads the audience to the conclusion that certain breeds and their extreme traits and appearances are inhumane (Goeff).

Whether "Qualzucht" will follow in the footsteps of the other labels is yet to be determined, but based on the past, it is safe to say that without research via Citizen Science or the Acorn grant, breeds that use crop and dock will be labeled "torture breeds". The label will attract the attention of the public and juries will not look kindly on breeds that use surgery unless there are studies and research to show why it is needed, or how it can be linked to the form and function of a breed. Lessons from the past confirm that labels have, and will continue to be, an effective tool that wins on issues of importance. Therefore, research and science needs to be used that will clarify and bring into focus a better understanding of the issues.

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Healing Dogs with Their Own Cells: The Promise of Regenerative Medicine



Imagine helping your dog heal from an injury or arthritis using their own cells. It sounds like science fiction, but that's the promise of regenerative medicine for pets. Regenerative medicine refers to advanced therapies that tap into the body's natural healing abilities—treatments like stem cell therapy, platelet-rich plasma (PRP), and others. The goal is a faster recovery by aiding the body to heal itself so dogs can enjoy healthier, more vibrant lives.

What Exactly Are Stem Cells?

You've probably heard of stem cells—but what are they, exactly? In short, they're versatile cells capable of becoming different types of tissue. Some are true blank slates, able to turn into any cell in the body, while others are more specialized and limited in what they can become.

This unique power makes stem cells so exciting: they don't just fight disease, they can actually rebuild tissue and speed healing.

Where Do Stem Cells Come From in Dogs?

Stem cells are extraordinary, and they're already inside us. Even as adults, we carry these natural tools for growth and repair. Scientists are finding ways to tap into their potential to treat injuries and disease.

Two of the richest sources are bone marrow and fat (adipose) tissue. Fat is especially abundant in stem cells, and collecting a small fat sample is quick, simple, and minimally invasive.

How Does Stem Cell Therapy Work?

So, how do we go from a bit of fat tissue to repaired tissue? Here's what canine stem cell therapy can look like:

Collect: A small fat sample is taken from an area like the belly or shoulder area through a tiny incision.

Isolate: In the lab, stem cells are extracted from the fat. Thanks to their abundance in fat tissue, a therapeutic dose of stem cells can be ready in hours.

Inject: The cells are put directly into the problem area, like an arthritic joint or injured tendon, where they reduce inflammation, release growth factors, and help regenerate healthy tissue.

Next-Level Therapy: Priming Cells for Targeted Repair

Many stem cell therapies inject cells directly into damaged areas and let them get to work healing. Researchers are also developing ways to guide stem cells into becoming specific tissues, like cartilage or muscle, before they ever enter the body.

In Australia, Dr. Ronald Sluyter's team at the University of Wollongong, working with the AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF), is exploring this approach for damaged joints. They're studying two enzymes, CD73 and CD39, that influence adenosine, a chemical that controls the immune system and helps tissues respond to stress. By using targeted antibodies to block these enzymes, the team hopes to reduce arthritis-related inflammation.


The work is still in early stages, but could one day give vets more options to treat damaged joints. Dr. Sluyter first discovered this enzyme connection in dogs through his human medicine research, and sees promise for both species.

"Dogs are a very important part of people's lives and the fabric of our society," Dr. Sluyter said. "Hopefully our work can help with more diseases like cancer therapies, autoimmune conditions – inflammation is central to most diseases. We want to try to raise awareness to show that what we discover in humans can be applied to companion animals."

Proven Benefits for Dogs Today

Regenerative therapies are already helping dogs with osteoarthritis and joint injuries. Studies show treated dogs often limp less, have less pain, and move more easily. Early research also suggests they can speed ligament healing and reduce scarring. One trial is testing stem cells for a common shoulder tendon injury in dogs, aiming to restore function without chronic pain.

Research is expanding beyond joints, too. A recent CHF-funded study used a dog's muscle-derived regenerative cells to treat urinary incontinence (leaking urine) in female dogs that didn't respond to standard therapies. Amazingly, it found that 14 out of 15 dogs showed significant improvement, and many remained mostly continent for at least two years.

A note from our Referral Coordinator Joye Evans



I joined the GSDC of Atlanta in 1972, moved out of the area and continued in obedience with my dogs until we moved back to Atlanta in 1984. I rejoined the club in 1988 after my old dogs had died and I purchased a puppy from Caralon Kennels.

I've had dogs that were shown in conformation, obedience, rally, herding, FastCat, and dabbled in tracking and nose work.

Questions that I ask callers

Have you ever owned a GSD before

What area of town do you live in or does it matter how far away the puppy is located

Do you have a fenced yard or what is your exercise plan

Do you want a puppy or an older dog

What do you want to do with your dog - pet, show, performance, etc.

How did you find out about the club

Questions I advise callers to ask the person with puppies. Callers frequently know of "puppies" from a friend knows someone who has a litter.

What health screenings do the parents have, i.e. OFA, DM, etc.

Make sure you meet the dam of the puppies, if you don't like her leave

How old is the dam

Do they have both parents on site

I tell everyone that calls – your dog needs a job – if you don't give him one, they will make their own job.

Everyone has their own hot buttons and these are mine. I've been fortunate to have great mentors over the years. Scootie Sherlock of Caralon Kennels, was my first mentor and was always there for me even after I no longer had a dog from her bloodlines. Find yourself a mentor and then listen.

Club's Breeder Referral

I offer referrals towards our club members first. If I don't know of any club puppies, I offer names of others local to our area that I know offer a good dog and will stand behind their puppies. And I give no preferences to anyone – I try to be as unbiased as possible.

The below questions are based on my experience as a breeder and owner. My first dog purchase in 1968 was an inbred father/daughter litter, and he had the most titles of any dog in his 5-generation pedigree – a CDX. I will credit him with establishing my love of the breed and we had a lot of fun.

Members, keep me in the loop! Let me know if you're having puppies, planning a litter, or have a dog you want to place. MEET THE BREEDER—Don't be put off if a breeder isn't immediately

• MEET THE BREEDER—Don't be put off if a breeder isn't immediately responsive. Some breeders have full-time jobs, and they don't always have available puppies. Be selective. Find a breeder who is knowledgeable and make sure you're comfortable with them. Establish a good rapport with them as they will be an excellent resource and breed mentor for you throughout the life of your puppy. *

• ASK ABOUT THE PUPPY'S PARENTS— Get an idea of what the future holds for your dog in terms of temperament and appearance. Breeders should be honest about the breed's strengths and weaknesses and knowledgeable about the genetic diseases that can affect their breed — including what's being done to avoid them. *

• Don't expect to bring home the puppy until it's 8 to 12 weeks of age. A puppy needs ample time to mature and socialize with its mother and littermates.*






September Meeting

Old Business:


- Novembers shows in Perry have been approved by AKC and fees paid.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:18pm.






